# **POLICE REPORT**

## **ESKBANK & NEWBATTLE COMMUNITY COUNCIL**

Good Morning/Afternoon.

#### Report

In the block 02/06/2021 – 26/08/2021 the beat codes which cover the Eskbank & Newbattle CC areas recorded approximately 78 crimes in total, of which at the time of reporting 62 were solved, giving a solvency rate of approximately 79.5%

It should be observed that several crime reports relate to issues that are not of note to the local community, the above numbers are representative and should accurate verified statistics be required this should be dealt with via a freedom of information request.

#### Quad Bikes

Midlothian Police Community officers have lead a pioneering project to become the first division in Police Scotland to secure the procurement of AED's for deployment on our off road quad bikes.

Our quad bike officers are trained to traverse difficult rural locations and access off road locations, the addition of AED's increases the lifesaving capabilities of our officers going forward.

#### Incidents of Note

On 01/06/2021 police were called to a property on Eskbank Road, the property had been broken into. However no high value items were taken. Later on the same date, another property on Melville Road reported damage to a window and signs of unknown person(s) entry. Police traced and charged a 19 and 20 year old male with both offences. They have been reported to the Procurator Fiscal.

On 19/06/2021 police were on patrol in the Eskbank area and were alerted to the attention of an 18 year old male in the grounds of Newbattle Abbey College, the male

appeared as to be under the influence of cannabis. After search he was found to be in possession of a green herbal matter. The male was issued a Recorded Police Warning.

On 20/06/2021 police were notified of a possibly skinned squirrel on Park Road, Eskbank. The SSPCA attended and enquiries are ongoing to establish circumstances.

Very little of note to report during July/August 2021.

### **Road Traffic**

There have been numerous calls to the police in relation to road traffic offences and speeding in the local area, in the last quarter enforcement action has been carried out in the ward area.

This has resulted in numerous persons being charged with road traffic offences.

Enforcement will continue in the area, with roads policing, safety camera partnership and community ward officers aware of ongoing concerns in the ward area.

Parking is an ongoing issue in the ward area, unfortunately the majority of which is currently a Midlothian Council issue and relates to non-criminal parking issue such as "parking on double yellow lines".

Officers are aware of reported parking offences and hot spot areas have been identified, enquiries are ongoing in relation to these reports.

### **Fraud & Bogus Callers**

Can I please take this time to make members aware that there is an increase throughout the UK of internet fraud and bogus callers?

In regards to bogus callers please see the advice below.

Rogue traders and bogus callers operate throughout the year but become more frequent after spring.

Current restrictions mean more people are at home when they would usually be at work, and as a result they may encounter more doorstep callers who know householders will most likely be in when they ring the doorbell.

Police Scotland is asking the public to follow its advice if they receive an unexpected, and unknown, caller at the door:

- Always ask for identification;
- Never feel pressured into making an on the spot decision;
- Never hand over money on the doorstep.

### **Theft & Housebreaking**

As in previous reports, Theft Housebreaking remains an ongoing issue in Midlothian and in our ward.

There are ongoing police actions to tackle housebreakings to both domestic and business dwellings, however residents are encouraged to take responsible preventative measures in relation to the security of their personal belongings.

#### **What basic steps can I take to protect my home?**

Having your home broken into is not common. There are however many ways that you can help secure your home. They don't all cost money – some are common sense and good housekeeping.

First, think about basic good housekeeping routines that aren't expensive:

- Keep your home locked at all times
- Many thieves do not need to break in at all because a door or window has been left open or unlocked
- Don't leave keys on the inside of door locks, under mats or anywhere else they can be easily found
- If you have a 'thumb turn' lock on the inside of a door, ensure that it cannot be accessed from outside
- See details on letter-plates, glazing and adjacent windows advice below
- Don't put your name or room number on your keyring if you live in shared accommodation, if it is lost or stolen, the thief will have information that could direct them there
- Don't keep house keys and car keys on the same key ring
- Don't keep a lot of cash in the house
- Mark your property with a UV marker pen or Security DNA marking Kit - these can be bought online or in some stores
- Look for the Secured By Design accreditation on the product and register - you can place an invisible imprint of your postcode and house number on your possessions
- You can record and register details of your valuables, serial numbers and features or marks, on devices on the national mobile property register on [the immobilise website](#) - this includes mobile phones, cameras, laptops and tablets
- Don't leave valuables where they can be seen through a window - for example, around the tree at Christmas time
- If you have a wall calendar, avoid having it shown near a window from where appointments can be seen - people may see when there will be no one in.

Thieves continue to operate in our area.
